


PLASTICS: POISONING THE PLANET




In this war, there are no winners.

Through personal stories from people on both sides of the conflict and powerful footage, FAVELA FRONTLINES takes you straight to the frontline of the battle between police and drug traffickers in Brazil. On average, one policeman is killed every two days. There are 60,000 homicides every year.

Interspersed with the stories are interviews with judges, journalists, slum residents and historians. They reflect on Brazil's public safety policy of the past three decades, the impact of social inequality and the legacy of slavery. As sociologist Luiz Eduardo Soares explains: "Police brutality wouldn't exist without tacit society authorisation."

For one gang member, it's very simple. "When I was 10, they slapped me in the face. Now I carry a rifle. Now you can't slap me in the face."



Over a thousand migrants have drowned in the Mediterranean this year, trying to make it to Europe. When Frontex reduced EU coastguard missions, the charities were forced to step in. But now, NGO rescue ships find themselves unable to operate, accused of encouraging smugglers.

In this powerful film, we follow the NGO ship 'luventa', operated by the Jugend Rettet network of young Europeans who challenge the idea of 'Fortress Europe'. In 2016 and 2017, it carried out 15 missions, rescuing more than 14,000 people, before it was seized by the Italian government..

From the luventa's first voyage in 2016 to the seizure of the ship more than a year later and the fate of those rescued, we follow events as they happen. It's a complex story, capturing both the drama of the rescues and the political awakening of the young protagonists, who find themselves at the forefront of this horror and death, overwhelmed by the vastness and complexities of the problem. Compelling, urgent viewing.



FRAGILES: DESTINED BY BIRTH?

Four baby girls from four different continents, all born in 2005 into precarious

circumstances. Alaishri arrived in the middle of a tribal conflict in India. Secret was born just after the civil war in Liberia. Noelia comes from an impoverished indigenous family in Bolivia. And Daniela is the daughter of a Congolese undocumented immigrant. We followed them over the first year of their lives and then returned ten years later. In telling their stories, we also tell the stories of their countries.

to take photos of some logged trees. The land was owned by farmer, Ian Turnbull, who had already been prosecuted for illegal land clearing. Without warning, Turnbull appeared and started firing. When Turner ran for cover, Turnbull shot him in the back and left him to die. This film examines at the consequences of the killing and the tensions between farmers and environmentalists over land clearing.




USA: LIFE IN A HIGH SECURITY PRISON

Here, three quarters of the prisoners have been convicted of violent crimes and serve an average of 27 years. How is the prison managed?


In the past ten years, more than 200,000 people have been murdered in Mexico. Most of the victims came from the streets of Ciudad Juarez, near the US border, where the rival La Línea and Sinaloa cartels fight over control of the cocaine market to America.

For several months, journalist Thierry Gaytan infiltrated the La Línea cartel, following the cocaine trail from Ciudad Juarez to New York. First the drugs cross the border towards El Paso, Texas, where they are stored for a few days before being shipped to major American cities like New York, Las Vegas or Los Angeles.

To combat these cartels, the Mexican authorities have deployed more than 250 federal police officers throughout the region. On the US side, border guards patrol relentlessly. But nothing seems to make a difference.

Filmed at high risk, this report gets to the heart of the Mexican-US drugs trade.





Critics claim they're little more than 'torture camps', taking tough love way too far. But for desperate parents, military-style boot camps are often seen as the last chance for their children to avoid the vicious cycle of delinquency and jail.

We spent five months at the Discovery Challenge Academy, which welcomes 125 troubled adolescents every year. The first two weeks are the hardest. Everything is strictly regimented: 10 minutes to eat, 2 minutes to shower, 10 seconds to put on socks. There are 50 beds per dormitory and even to going to the bathroom requires permission. Phone, TV and internet are all banned, as is seeing family during the first three months.

Who are these young people? How did they get there and what trials and difficulties will they have to overcome?



Imagine a world where the only fish that children see are in aquariums. Where the fish that we eat comes from farms and the only animal we come across when swimming in the sea are jellyfish.

This isn't the premise of a new horror film but what could really happen in a few decades if some predictions are to be believed. It has happened in Namibia already. Overfishing destroyed sardine stocks and, as a result, the 10 million tonnes of sardines fished in the 1960s gave way to 12 million tonnes of jellyfish. A study published in the scientific journal Nature estimates that all fisheries will have closed by 2048, if we do not change our fishing practices.

Today, 90% of fisheries are fully or overexploited as demand for fish grows. In the sixties, the average world consumption was 10 kg. By 2012, it had risen to 19 kg. But unlike other forms of protein, fish is the last food we eat that still comes from the wild. We investigate the state of global fish stocks.







The Accabadora or 'Lady of the Kind Death' was a woman in Sardinian culture who performed an ancient form of euthanasia, an act of mercy for the terminally ill in order to put an end to their suffering. It was a ritual of Sardinian tradition with roots going back into the mists of time, but carried out as recently as the 1960s. Kept concealed and out of sight of the Roman Catholic culture that considered her a murderer, the Femmina Accabadora is a legendary figure - as alive in the popular mind as the vampires of Transylvania.

In this film, we hear from eye witnesses who break the code of silence still in place to this day. We learn where and how they lived and how they were perceived by the community at large. We'll see how the rite itself was carried out. An immersion inside a culture that is thousands of years old and a relationship with death that is as natural as life itself.


RIDERS OF DESTINY follows two young child jockeys and their families in a sport where your health and future prospects depend on the outcome of every race...



'Happy Heart Syndrome', discovered in March 2016 and associated with the euphoria of falling in love, has a similarly dramatic impact on our bodies. And marriage increases the life expectancy of men but decrease that of women.


Ratko MLADIĆ



This film tells the riveting story of the trial of Ratko Mladić, following the drama – both inside the courtroom and in the offices of the prosecutors and defense lawyers – as the event unfolds.

Sandpaper Films has negotiated exclusive access to the trial. In its twenty-one years of existence, the International Criminal Tribunal For The Former Yugoslavia has never granted this kind of access before.

Both sides are working under immense pressure - the defense have an erratic and uncompromising client while the prosecution must translate their promise of justice into a guilty verdict if Mladić's victims are to achieve some modicum of peace. Will its deliberations write a 'history' of the conflict that can be universally accepted? And perhaps most significantly, can the Tribunal represent a model for post-conflict resolution?



A hoodie, pants, a belt. That's what's left of 'Number 387', one of 800 migrants who perished off the Libyan coast. On the military base in Sicily, Cristina Cattaneo leads the identification operation. Patiently, she inspects every garment. Who was this young man? How can his name be restored and family found?

From an examination of bones, 3D reconstruction and cross-checking DNA, Cristina and her team will do everything possible to find the "treasure of identity". In Greece, Pavlos Pavlidis has been working identifying anonymous migrants' bodies for 17 years. Like Cristina, he is one of the representatives of the ICRC for the identification of Mediterranean victims.

In the coming months, they will make every possible effort to restore a name to each shipwrecked numbers. Who are they? Who are we?

But in 2017, the head of the centre secured the money to build a new unit of marital facilities. Despite strong opposition, he was convinced the patients would benefit from being in a couple.

Are these two patients capable of having a relationship that leads to marriage? What do their families think? And what about the patients who weren't selected but still crave human relationships?
