
Founded in 2005, Java Films rapidly established itself as one of Europe's leading independent documentary distributors, providing production support and distribution to both finished films and projects in development.




BREATHLESS

Following the deaths of his father and many others from his village, filmmaker Daniel Lambo sets off on a

passionate quest to find the truth about the deadly asbestos industry. His search takes him to the largest asbestos waste dump in India and unveils a cold-blooded industry still endangering the lives of workers and consumers around the world. A gripping story about the fight of individuals against a booming asbestos industry.

Food production has increasingly become a huge business for a handful of giant corporations. *Soyalism* follows the industrial production chain of pork and the related soybean monoculture, from China to Brazil through the United States and Mozambique.

This eye-opening documentary describes the enormous concentration of power in the hands of these Western and Chinese companies and the impact this is having on the food we consume. Hundreds of thousands of small producers have gone out of business and entire landscapes have been permanently transformed. The system has been exported across the world.

From waste-lagoons in North Carolina to soybean monoculture in the Amazon rainforest, is this demand for soy bean jeopardizing the environmental balance of the planet?

After the arrests of the Mafia godfathers during the early 2000s, Italy hoped that it had finally put an end to organized crime. Instead, some of the notorious mafia old guard have been replaced by a young generation of mobsters, known as the 'Baby Mafia'.

Led by reckless adolescents known as the 'Baby Bosses', the majority of these gangs can be found in Naples, home to hundreds of Camorra clans. Drug trafficking, thefts, extortion and racketeering run rife throughout the city. Yet unlike the generations of mafia that went before them, these youngsters do not respect the old rules. The slightest provocation can lead to carnage.

We meet these young Mafia leaders and go on patrol with the famous Falchi police unit, tasked with stopping them.



THE TRIAL OF RATKO MLADIC

On the 22nd of November 2017, the Bosnian Serb General, Ratko Mladic, was found

guilty of genocide and crimes against humanity in the Hague and sentenced to life in prison. Filmed over five years with unprecedented access to the prosecution, the defence, witnesses who came forward to give evidence and Mladic's family members, this film tells an epic story of justice, accountability and a country trying to escape from its bloody past.

One of the most enduring cultural stereotypes is the cliché of the crazy cat lady. But the relationship between

cats and humans is like no other. This film explores how humans coexist with cats by profiling the eclectic lives of devoted cat lovers. Meet Holly, who tries to overcome her allergy to cats by rubbing her face with kittens. Then there's 10 year old Kathy, who's on a mission to neuter the stray cats in her neighbourhood....

world. We hear from Sophie's family and friends and attempt to answer the question that will forever haunt her grieving parents: how could this happen?



GATES AND GHETTOS: RESIDENCES OF THE FUTURE?

It's the new housing trend. Entire private neighbourhoods,

all under extreme security and banned to non-residents. It used to be that these gated communities were home only to super-rich Americans but now they're appearing across the globe and are shaping new residences of the future. But as more and more people take refuge behind walls, will the remaining public space be turned into a giant ghetto?




USA: LOCKING UP CHILDREN

America is the only nation in the world that has not signed the International Convention on the Rights of the

Child. Signing would mean relaxing legislation on the confinement of minors. 70,000 minors are currently in American prisons, partly as a result of the judicialization of US society. Even in schools, police officers — not supervisors — now patrol the hallways. As a result, school-based misconduct has become a crime, sending students straight into the criminal system.




USA: LIFE IN A HIGH SECURITY PRISON

In the United States, there are more than two million people behind bars. That's

more than anywhere else in the world. 90% of prisoners serve time in one of the 1,700 State penitentiaries. One of them, the Anamosa State Penitentiary, granted us exceptional, round-the-clock access. Here, three quarters of the prisoners have been convicted of violent crimes and serve an average of 27 years. How is the prison managed?






Oxycontin. Codeine. Fentanyl. All prescription drugs to which countless patients have become addicted. As America battles an opioid crisis that sees 170 citizens die everyday, lawyers and prosecutors are trying to bring an end to Big Pharma's impunity. How did it happen?

Midwest City, Oklahoma. Dr Regan Nichols is on trial charged with five murders for overprescribing opioids. Her lawyer insists that she is being made a scape-goat. But others believe that doctors like Nichols bear a large responsibility for the crisis now engulfing the country.

During the 90s, strong, opium-based pain killers like Oxycontin were rebranded and aggressively marketed for all types of pain. By the time the dangers of these pills became apparent and regulators started restricting access, it was too late. Denied the prescription drugs they had become dependent on, addicts turned to harder drugs like heroin.

From sex scandals with global repercussions to promoting a national chastity movement, American views on sex veer from one extreme to the other. We travel across the country to find out more.

Silicon Valley executive, Nathalie, doesn't have time to look for a soul mate. So she's hired a relationship coach for \$30,000 to do it for her. As well as hand-picking candidates, her coach discreetly monitors her dates, feeding her instructions through an earpiece on how to behave.

For many, sex is guided by their religion. Nathalie and Matthew chose to remain virgin until marriage. But in some cities, Evangelical Christianity is making access to abortion virtually impossible. Gynaecologist, Willie Parker, regularly receives death threats for providing abortions in the southern states. Meanwhile, Adam, Brooke and Eve are poly-lovers, raising their four children together.



USA: BEING POOR IN THE WORLD'S RICHEST COUNTRY

43 million people in the United States now live below the poverty line,

twice as many as it was fifty years ago. 1.5 million children are homeless — that's three times more than during the Great Depression of the 1930s. Entire families are being tossed from one place to another to work unstable jobs that barely allow them to survive. In the poorest neighbourhoods, associations offer small wooden huts to those who no longer have shelter.

DEATH IN LEON: CLOSED CASE

Leon, Spain. 12th of May 2014. Isabel Carrasco, president of the provincial government of

Leon, is murdered in broad daylight. Feared and hated for her autocratic rule, many people wanted her dead. Three women were quickly arrested in what appeared to be an inexplicable private vendetta. But as the investigation developed, a deeper story of power, deceit and betrayal emerged.

MEET THE MENNONITES

Like the Amish, the ultra-conservative Christian community of the Mennonites reject modern society

and live a life frozen in the 19th century. Nearly all Mennonites live in self-sufficient colonies, embracing isolation, which helps protect them from the temptations of the modern world. Now, for the first time, one of these communities has agreed to open their doors to our cameras. An unprecedented look at the world of the Mennonites.



GREEN WARRIORS: PARAGUAY'S POISONED FIELDS

Since 2001, five million hectares of forests have

been destroyed in Paraguay to make way for soybean plantations. Soy fields now surround many villages and their residents are being poisoned by pesticides. In 2014, Adela, 6 months old, and Adélaïde, 3 years old, both died within a few hours, after being exposed to pesticide spreadings. Working with scientists, the *Green Warriors* team investigates the genetic damage to children exposed to these pesticides.

When hijabs provoke insults and mosques are under attack, what does it mean to be 14 and Muslim? This documentary

follows young teens as they make the transition from a private Islamic elementary school to public secondary schools and take their first tentative steps towards adulthood. Up-close and personal, 14 & Muslim looks at how ideas of diversity and tolerance play out in the classroom.

CHOCOLATE'S DARKEST SECRETS

In 2001, the lucrative chocolate industry, promised to put an end to child labour in cacoa

plantations. 18 years later, has that promise been kept? The Ivory Coast, the world's largest cacao producer, made a real effort to eradicate child labour. But in isolated areas of the forest, Paul Moreira discovered child slaves, forced to work in plantations, their incomes often seized by traffickers. These child slaves are separated from their parents and sometimes resold onto other traffickers.




BIG PROBLEM: THE BISE OF OBESITY

According to a recent study, China has the largest number of obese children in the world. 450 million Chinese people are overweight and even babies are being born weighing more than six kilos. A phenomenon never before seen in the country's history.

Expansion and economic growth have changed the lifestyles of Chinese people. Authorities are tackling this epidemic with prison camps for overweight people run by soldiers. Television shows, smartphone applications, doctors and nutritionists are encouraging the entire nation to get into shape.

Weight loss has become a national issue and founded a new trend: youtubers who gorge themselves live on the Internet in front of millions of spectators. How has China progressed from a starving country at the beginning of the 21st century to having one of the highest obesity rates in the world?

PLEASURE AND PAIN



THE SCIENCE OF LOVE

Love can change our lives - in the truest sense of the word. Recent studies prove that love is more than just an emotion. It is a drive that transforms our brain and our body profoundly.

Researchers in New York have found that the need for love is deeply rooted in our brain stem, together with the need for food. And it really is possible to die of a broken heart. The symptoms of 'Broken Heart Syndrome', caused by extreme emotional stress, are the same as for a heart attack.

Pleasure and pain: The Science of Love is an exciting visual journey through the world of love from birth to death. Astonishing facts are presented clearly, with answers to all the questions we have always asked ourselves: Why do lovers have palpitations? Does love come from the brain or from the heart? And why does heartbreak hurt so much?



IMMORTALS?

The idea of postponing or even reversing the ageing process has always fascinated humanity. Some claim that immortality

will be possible as little as thirty years from now - but will it just be for the rich? We visited research laboratories working on this objective and interviewed the world's top researchers in the field. We also visited the clinic, which, for \$8,000, will conduct a blood transfusion with blood from a young person. Do treatments like this really work?




THE SCIENCE OF HAPPINESS

BRAZIL: BEEF, BIBLES AND BULLETS

The election of President Jair Bolsonaro's was made possible by support

from three powerful groups - large landowners, evangelical clerics and the military. Nicknamed the "BBBs": Beef, Bibles and Bullets, the BBBs are in vehement opposition to abortion rights and gay marriage. They do, however, support the right to bear firearms and the destruction of the Amazonian rainforest for the benefit of agrobusiness.




FAVELA FRONTLINES

Through personal stories from people on both sides of the conflict and powerful footage, *Favela*

Frontlines takes you straight to the heart of the battle between police and drug traffickers in Brazil. On average, one policeman is killed every two days. There are 60,000 homicides every year. Interspersed with the stories are interviews reflecting on Brazil's public safety policy of the past three decades, the impact of social inequality and the legacy of slavery.

For decades, marijuana was a key part of the counter-culture movement, dubbed 'probably the most dangeorous drug' by President Reagan and detested by the establishment. But as the movement to 'normalize' it grows and more and more states chose regulation over probhibition, what happens when weed goes corporate? What impact does it have on violence, public health and state finances? Are the key beneficiaries big corporations?

In Holland, the law protects consumers but not the sellers, who operate in a grey legal area. Legally-grown marijuana in America is now more competivie than the marijuana grown in Mexico and sold on black market. Petty dealers are being forced to sell harder products.

Filmed in the United States, Canada, Uruguay, Mexico and Europe, this film profiles the experience of pioneer countries. Did legalization fulfill all the expectations it raised?



They're bankers, traders or investment funds executives. Frauds, lies, cons: they forgot all about morality to make money. They impoverished countries, drove millions of workers into unemployment, triggered the rise in extremism. But who are they?

This is a story about money, power and impunity. Ten years after the crisis, tongues finally loosen. We hear from the banksters themselves, their relatives, the former "insiders" they rub shoulders with, to those who were in the eye of the storm. Through personal stories, the film explores the mechanisms that led them to cross the red line. It investigates what goes through their minds, how they ended up where they are, and how the system used some of them.

It also poses two specific questions: After the 2008 crisis, were the real culprits condemned? And could this happen again?

THE FAREWELL CASE: THE KGB DOUBLE AGENT

It's a story that even the best spy novelists couldn't have invented, complete

with double agents and the CIA battling the KGB. In the midst of the cold war, a KGB mole passed on thousands of highly confidential documents to the French secret services, who, in turn, passed them onto the CIA. They were used to destabilize the Russians and ultimately led to the fall of the Eastern bloc. How did Vladimir Vetrov, a modest KGB agent, become Farewell, the biggest mole of the Cold War?

A PLASTIC SURGERY: COCA COLA'S HIDDEN SECRETS

Every second, another ten tons of plastic is produced. 10% of all

plastic produced ends up in the oceans, leading to predictions that, by 2050, there will be more plastic than fish in the sea. Faced with this global scourge, more and more businesses are promising to recycle, including the Coca-Cola Company, a group that sells 4000 plastic bottles around the world every second. Can we depend on the promises made by these multinationals?

UNDER THE SKIN

One in three people suffer from a skin disorder like eczema, acne or psoriasis. While many will

recover, for some, it is a lifelong condition. Tonje's skin grows seven times faster than normal. She has to vacuum her bed every morning. Vilde is covered with vitiligo that makes her almost completely white. Sanna struggles with psoriasis that affects her self-confidence and social life. How do they feel about being different?



REBUILDING MOSUL

On July 10th 2017, Mosul, the second largest city in Iraq, was liberated from ISIS after nine months

of fighting. It was most significant urban battle since the World War II. For a year, we followed the Iraqis' efforts to rebuild their city. Through key figures we document the difficulties faced by the population of Mosul, the laxity of the Iraqi administration, the concerns of the international community and the danger of ISIS' return.

DARAYA: A LIBRARY UNDER BOMBS

At the heart of the Syrian civil war, a group of activists created an

underground library in the besieged outskirts of Damascus. Despite ceaseless bombing, they not only saved books from the rubble, but created a secret library, which quickly became a safe haven for peace, freedom and democracy: a special experience that they filmed and documented meticulously. A story of hope and survival.

GENERATION RAQQA



Inspired by the mythology of the International Brigades of the Spanish Civil War, over 300 foreign volunteers chose to give up their comfortable lives and go fight ISIS in Raqqa. We filmed them there, fly-on-the-wall style, fighting, talking, laughing, being attacked by suicide bombs and sniper fire. We were with them until Raqqa was freed. And then we followed them back home - changed forever.

"I gave my life to help the people of Northern Syria, to stop the terrorists, but my government is more interested in trying to charge me with terrorism instead", complains former British Army soldier, Kevin. Josh, 22 from California, also finds the homecoming hard. "I miss Syria badly. War begot meaning to my life."

Made by acclaimed journalists Paul Moreira and Pedro Da Fonseca, this is the untold story of the young Westerners who left everything behind to fight ISIS.



The idea that we are living in the athropocene, a new geological age, and that humans have permanently changed the planet is still being debated. But were developments like the coal and oil age, which have had such a large impact on the environment, really inevitable? Could other paths have been taken and what would our world look like now if different decisions had been made?

The birth of the coal age at the beginning of the nineteenth century was orignally seen as an environmental solution, protecting England's forests. It ushered in the industrial revolution and is largely responsible for the environmental turmoil of today.

Mixing footage and propaganda images with an original soundtrack, *Breakpoint* looks back at 200 years of development to provide an alternative view of history.



PALESTINE'S STOLEN IMAGES

A film-diary about the secret history of the links between the national liberation movements in Palestine

and Latin America. The film combines direct filming unfolding events of the war of liberation in the last 18 years with never-before-seen footage recovered from the Cuban Film archives, shot by the PLO Film Unit and previously considered lost. From the early contacts made by Che Guevara in Gaza, to the guerrilla camps in Colombia, this film connects the dots of a previously hidden history.

CHINA: THE NEW SILK ROAD

Chinese president XI Jinping has named it the 'project of the century.' Since 2013 China has invested

But they also act as a vehicle for a wave of Chinese expansionism across the world. We investigate.

In some regions, Sharia law has made a comeback. The Islamic police are watching, corporal punishment has been restored, women are all veiled and Koranic schools are multiplying.



WORLDS OF URSULA K LE GUIN

This film explores the remarkable life and legacy of the late feminist author Ursula

K. Le Guin. Best known for groundbreaking science fiction and fantasy works such as 'A Wizard of Earthsea', Le Guin defiantly held her ground on the margin of "respectable" literature until the sheer excellence of her work, at long last, forced the mainstream to embrace fantastic literature. Her fascinating story has never before been captured on film.



In the past ten years, more than 200,000 people have been murdered in Mexico. Most of the victims


came from the streets of Ciudad Juarez, near the US border, where the rival La Línea and Sinaloa cartels fight over control of the cocaine market to America. For several months, journalist Alejandro Delval infiltrated the La Línea cartel, following the cocaine trail from Ciudad Juarez to New York. Filmed at high risk, this report gets to the heart of the Mexican-US drugs trade.



Raging megafires that burn for months. Super eruptions with the potential of a Hiroshima bomb exploding every two or three minutes. Asteroid strikes so violent they wiped out entire species. Devastating tsunamis, tornadoes and earthquakes....

For those more party inclined, Isghgl in Austria is the resort that never sleeps, known for having more bars and nightclubs than ski lifts!

It has the ability to shelter troops, helicopters and vehicles. We discover its many capabilities. Part of a five episode series.



EXTREME CONSTRUCTIONS: GRAND PARIS EXPRESS

With its 200 kilometres of automatic lines and 68 stations,

This means machines capable of digging in highly built-up areas to install stations more than 50 metres below the ground. It is this impressive technological challenge that foreshadows the transport of tomorrow.




Riders of Destiny follows two young child jockeys and their families in a sport where your health and future prospects depend on the outcome of every race...

On the the remote island of Sumbawa, Indonesia, the market for tiny jockeys is huge. The successful ones can earn enough money to feed their families for an entire generation. But while their ancestors began at 10, today's child jockeys often start at three. Firman, 5, is just starting out as a child jockey. He falls off his horse almost every day as he tries to reach speeds of 70 km/h – barefoot and without a saddle or any protective clothing.

Sila, 7 years old, is one of the most in-demand jockeys of all the young riders. His parents no longer have to work because the money he earns takes care of the whole family.

But in this traditional sport, accidents are frequent. Many children are crippled. Some die.



Encourage the patients of a mental hospital to form relationships with each other, get married and live as a family. That's the bold new idea of the head of Ehsan House in Southern Tehran. For the past 20 years, its 480 patients have lived in separate male or female units with no hope of ever leaving or of having meaningful sexual relationships.

But in 2017, the head of the centre secured the money to build a new unit of marital facilities. Despite strong opposition, he was convinced the patients would benefit from being in a couple.

As a selection committee begins evaluating patients, hidden affections come to the surface. Finally the team selects two patients to form the first couple. Are these two patients capable of having a relationship that leads to marriage? What do their families think? And what about the patients who weren't selected but still crave human relationships?



A hoodie, pants, a belt. That's what's left of 'Number 387', one of 800 migrants who perished off the Libyan coast. On the military base in Sicily, Cristina Cattaneo leads the identification operation. Patiently, she inspects every garment. Who was this young man? How can his name be restored and family found?

From an examination of bones, 3D reconstruction and cross-checking DNA, Cristina and her team will do everything possible to find the "treasure of identity". In Greece, Pavlos Pavlidis has been working identifying anonymous migrants' bodies for 17 years. Like Cristina, he is one of the representatives of the ICRC for the identification of Mediterranean victims.

In the coming months, they will make every possible effort to restore a name to each shipwrecked numbers. Who are they? Who are we?
